Keir Starmer QC, the Director of Public Prosecutions, has recently introduced six "mitigating factors' which may affect whether someone assisting the suicide of a terminally ill person should face criminal prosecution. The guidelines state that to escape criminal prosecution, the person assisting suicide should be motivated by compassion, should have attempted to dissuade the patient, be assured of the patient's personal and voluntary determination to die, offer only minor help, and report the suicide to the police. Starmer still warns that some helpers could still be charged with murder or manslaughter, and that his guidelines are not intended to legalise euthanasia. What do you think about these guidelines?
