1. When do you think abortion should be legal?

Abortion should always be legal .....20%  
 Abortion should be generally legal, but with some restrictions ..... 28%  
 Abortion should be generally illegal, except in special circumstances .... 35%  
 Abortion should always be illegal .....14%  
 Not sure ..... 4%

2. The U.S. Supreme Court decision in Roe v. Wade established that a woman has a constitutional right to an abortion until the fetus is viable outside the womb, around 22 to 24 weeks of pregnancy. Do you think this Supreme Court decision should be overturned, or kept in place?

Overtuned ..... 36%  
 Kept in place .....48%  
 Not sure ..... 16%

3. Do you think Congress should pass more restrictions on abortions, lift existing restrictions on abortion, or keep restrictions about the same?

<b>Interviewing Dates</b>	February 10 - 12, 2016
<b>Target population</b>	U.S. adults, aged 18 and over.
<b>Sampling method</b>	Respondents were selected from YouGov’s opt-in Internet panel using sample matching. A random sample (stratified by age, gender, race, education, and region) was selected from the 2010 American Community Study. Voter registration was imputed from the November 2010 Current Population Survey Registration and Voting Supplement. Religion, minor party identification, and non-placement on an ideology scale, were imputed from the 2008 Pew Religion in American Life Survey.
<b>Weighting</b>	The sample was weighted using propensity scores based on age, gender, race, education, voter registration, and non-placement on an ideology scale. The weights range from 0.043 to 4.072, with a mean of one and a standard deviation of 0.867.
<b>Number of respondents</b>	1000
<b>Margin of error</b>	± 4.1% (adjusted for weighting)
<b>Survey mode</b>	Web-based interviews
<b>Questions not reported</b>	20 questions not reported.
