A referendum is to be held next month on changing the electoral system from first-past-the-post (FPTP) to the Alternative Vote (AV).

At the moment, under first-past-the-post (FPTP), voters select ONE candidate with an 'x', and the candidate with the most votes wins.

It has been suggested that this system should be replaced by the Alternative Vote (AV). Voters would RANK a number of candidates from a list – '1' for their first choice, '2' for their second choice and so on. How easy or difficult would you personally find it to vote in this way?

Under AV, you would have the chance of stating your second choice, third choice and so on. But, if you wanted, you could give your first choice and not give any others. If the next election is fought under AV, do you think you would...

Not vote at all

In an AV election, the '1st' preference votes are counted first. If a candidates wins more than half of the '1st' votes, a winner is declared. If not, the least popular candidates are eliminated from the contest, and their supporters' subsequent preferences counted and shared accordingly between the remaining candidates. This process continues until one of the candidate's secures a majority of the vote (50%+) and is declared the winner.

Do you think this is...

More democratic than the present system, because it means that the eventual winner has more popular support in some form than any other candidate

Less democratic than the present system because the candidate with the most first preferences may sometimes lose once a range of voters' preferences are taken into consideration

Some people have suggested that, under AV, when voters' first choice candidate has been eliminated, and their later choices come into play, these second and subsequent choices should count for only half a vote each.
