Currently people in employment have to pay both Income Tax and National Insurance contributions on their wages. While National Insurance contributions are theoretically put towards paying the state pension and other benefits, they are effectively another tax on income.

Some people have suggested that National Insurance and Income Tax should be combined into a single tax. This would simplify the tax system and mean that self-employed people, who currently pay a lower rate of national insurance, would pay the same level of tax as employed people. It would also require a few benefits, that are currently based upon people's levels of national insurance contributions, to be reformed.
